

Cowlishaw, William Harrison 1869 - 1957

William Harrison Cowlishaw [also known as W.H. Cowlishaw, and as W. Harrison Cowlishaw] was born in Godstone, Surrey, England on 4 December 1869 and was articled to Stockdale Harrison (1846-1914) in Leicester, and to Eustace James Anthony Balfour (1854-1911) and Hugh Thackeray Turner (1853-1937) of Balfour & Turner.

He commenced independent practice as an architect in c.1896. His best known work as an architect was The Cloisters in Letchworth Garden City, Hertfordshire, built in 1905-07.

Following World War One, he was commissioned by the War Graves Commission to design memorials and cemeteries in France and Belgium.

In addition to his work as an architect, he was also an illuminator, decorative designer and ceramic artist. In 1907 he established the Icen Pottery Company in Letchworth Garden City which was active until 1914.

Cowlishaw was elected a Fellow of the Royal Institute of British Architects (FRIBA) in 1939. He was a member of the Arts & Crafts Exhibition Society and exhibited and participated in their 4th (1893), 5th (1896), 6th (1899), 7th (1903); 8th (1906); 9th (1910); 10th (1912) and 11th (1916) exhibitions in London. He was also elected a member of the Art Workers Guild in 1917.

His address was given as 3 Raymond Buildings [TAB] Gray's Inn, London in 1893; 6 Great James Street, Bedford Row, London in 1896; The Icen Pottery Co., Letchworth in 1910 and 1912; 6 Great James Street, Bedford Row, London in 1916; and 10 Litchfield Way, Finchley, London in 1939. He died in Victoria Hospital, Deal, Dover, Kent on 17 March 1957.
