Holford & Clayton 1876 - 1882

Holford & Clayton was an architectural partnership formed in Brighton, Sussex, England in 1876 by <u>George Holford</u> (1851-1938?) and <u>Charles Edward Clayton</u> (1851-1938), both of whom had trained with the local architect Thomas Simpson (1825–1908). In 1882 <u>Ernest Black</u> (1855-1917) joined the practice which was renamed <u>Holford</u>, Clayton & Black. Holford left the following year, at which point the firm became <u>Clayton & Black</u>.

Worked in UK Works

Architectural work by Holford & Clayton included alterations to Blenheim House, 56 Old Steine, Brighton (1875–76); and modifications to the Friends Meeting House, Prince Albert Street, Brighton (1876-77).
