

Holford & Clayton 1876 - 1882

Holford & Clayton was an architectural partnership formed in Brighton, Sussex, England in 1876 by [George Holford](#) (1851-1938?) and [Charles Edward Clayton](#) (1851-1938), both of whom had trained with the local architect Thomas Simpson (1825–1908). In 1882 [Ernest Black](#) (1855-1917) joined the practice which was renamed [Holford, Clayton & Black](#). Holford left the following year, at which point the firm became [Clayton & Black](#).

Architectural work by Holford & Clayton included alterations to Blenheim House, 56 Old Steine, Brighton (1875–76); and modifications to the Friends Meeting House, Prince Albert Street, Brighton (1876-77).
