

George (T.) & Son 1887 - 1910

T. George & Son was an architectural and building firm established in Ashton-under-Lyne, Lancashire, England in 1887 [or 1890 - sources differ] by Thomas G. George (1823-1896), a builder and timber merchant, in partnership with his son, [William Henry George](#) (1854-1934), a trained architect.

Following the death of his father in 1896, W. H. George retained the original name of the business which he ran for several years. T. George & Son submitted an entry in a competition to design the Middle School for Boys and Girls in Tiverton, Devon. Their designs are illustrated in *British Competitions in Architecture* vol. 2, no. 20, February 1909 (pp. 261). The address of the firm was given as 7 Warrington Street, Ashton-under-Lyne, Lancashire in 1905 and 1908.

In 1910 W. H. George's sons joined the practice, at which point the name of the firm was changed to W. H. George & Sons

Five shops at St Michael's Square, Ashton-under-Lyne (1892); houses at Hooley Hill, Ashton-under-Lyne (1893); two houses on Richmond Street, Ashton-under-Lyne (1895); a stable and harness room in Droylesden, near Manchester (1895); two houses on George Mellor Road Ashton-under-Lyne (1900); three shops and a licensed house on Old Street Ashton-under-Lyne (1900); a two-storey building in Catford, London (1903); a house on Norman Road, Stalybridge, Lancashire (1903); and a cemetery chapel in Audenshaw, Manchester (1904).
